A DISH FOR THE WEEK

Regardless of season, fish at least once a week adds variety to the family menu; and if it is a sea fish, like salmon, it also adds vitamin D and iodine in the form of food.

Salmon Puff:
1 pound can of salmon
¾ cup of bread crumbs
½ cup of milk
1 tablespoon of butter
½ teaspoon of salt
¼ teaspoon of paprika
2 eggs.

Place the salmon with a silver fork, and add the seasoning to it. Soak the bread crumbs in the milk; add the salmon, then melt the butter and add to the mixture.

Separate the eggs; beat the yolks until they are thick and lemon-colored and the whites until they are stiff. Add the yolks to the salmon mixture and mix well, then fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites and put the mixture into buttered muffin pans. Bake this in a moderately hot oven, 350 degrees Fahrenheit, for about 20 minutes. Serve the salmon puffs with a medium white sauce or tomato juice. This recipe serves six persons.

An appetizing luncheon menu suggested by the New York State College of Home Economics, combines salmon puff and white sauce with lettuce salad and French dressing; whole wheat muffins, strawberry shortcake, iced tea for the grown-ups and milk for the children.
