Bolivar to Hold Old Home Week

Bolivar, July 15.—Two big parades, sensational triple parachute jumps daily, daring motorcycle stunts, dances, a sunset supper and carnival will feature Bolivar's third annual Old Home Week, July 18-24, sponsored by the Bolivar fire department.

The Andover Fire Department is expected to participate in the gigantic firemen's parade on Friday, July 23rd, which will climax the week's activities. Prizes aggregating \$40 will be given winners in this parade as follows: \$10 to the best appearing company; \$10 to the company with the most men in line; \$10 to the best ladies' auxiliary and \$10 to the best band or drum corps.

Judges of the parade will be Leslie LeSuer of Friendship, president this past year of the Allegany county Volunteer Firemen's Association; Karl Buehring of Wellsville, secretary of the County Association and L. J. MacDonnell, Bolivar supervisor.

The sensational triple parachute jump from a balloon by Eddie Allen, Jr., and his two sisters, Flossie and Gloria, will be a daily free attraction. The jumps will be made at about 7:30 o'clock each evening during the week. The Karl Middleton carnival will provide a gay midway attraction all week.

Daring motorcycle stunts and rides by a group of eight amateur riders will be held Tuesday evening at 7:30 o'clock. This will include trick and fancy riding, riding thru a horseshoe of fire, riding thru a barrier of boards, broad jumps and a grand march.

A pet parade and kiddies' night, when stunts and athletic contests will be held will be the attraction on Wednesday night. A colorful civic parade in which about 25 entries will compete for the \$10 prize to be awarded for the best float will be held at 7:30 p. m. The annual sunset supper, sponsored by the fire department auxiliary, will be held on the Methodist church lawn at 5:30 Thursday.

Dances sponsored by the firemen will be held Thursday and Friday evenings in a building on Main street that used to be a famous roller skating rink 50 years ago and is now used as a used car storage and sales room. Dana Williams orchestra will furnish the music.

The Bolivar Fire Department is leaving nothing undone to make this the biggest and most colorful Old Home Week celebration ever held here. The biggest crowds ever to attend a celebration in Bolivar are anticipated.

New York Boosts Spring Pig Crop

New York State's spring pig crop is nearly 24 per cent larger than in 1936 and 48 per cent larger than in 1935, according to State-Federal estimates issued this week by the Department of Agriculture and Markets and based upon reports received from farmers in the annual June livestock survey conducted in co-operation with the rural mail carriers of the Postoffice Department.

The report shows 192,000 spring pigs on hand, compared with 155,000 last year; 117,000 in 1935, and 136,000 the average in 1932 and 1933. The fall crop is estimated to be ten per cent less than in 1936, when 163,000 pigs were saved.
