COUNTY YOUTH CAMP OPENS SOON

Is Open to Boys and Girls of This Area. Will Be Held at Eggleston Park Beginning August 15th.

The Allegany County Youth Camp to be held at Eggleston Park opens for boys and girls of this area on August 15th and continues for a two week period. The camp is under the direction of Joe Jalone who successfully directed the Western New York District 4-H Camp at this location in 1936. The camp this year is open to any boy or girl between the ages of 8 and 20 of this Western New York area. Enrollments are being received at the present time at the 4-H Club office and Mr. Palone of Belmont. The courses included in this year's program include crafts, nature study, first aid, camping and woodcraft and social recreation. In addition to these regular courses instruction is given to all boys and girls in swimming by American Red Cross trained counselors. Camp fires and general recreational periods are open for the entire camping group.

The many improved facilities at Eggleston Park make the camp one of the best equipped in New York State. All campers are accommodated in modern, spacious cabins for sleeping quarters where they are divided in relative age-groups. The dining hall and kitchen have been equipped with new modern equipment and refrigeration. Running hot and cold water are now in the kitchen equipment. Modern plumbing has been installed in this camp area for the convenience of campers. Excellent play ground facilities are available on the large upper field along the river flats near the river. Excellent nature study facilities are available. The camp has accommodations for a total of 80 campers per week. Approximately 50 applications have been received to date and additional enrollments will be welcome from the boys and girls from this area.

ANNOUNCE SPEAKERS FOR DAIRY FIELD DAY

The Chief Speaker will be Dr. Reed of U. S. Department of Agriculture, at First Dairy Field Day in Batavia, July 31st.

Dr. O. E. Reed, chief of the bureau of dairy industry of the United States Department of Agriculture, has been engaged as the chief speaker at Western New York's first field day at Batavia, July 31st.

Others appearing on the program are Peter G. Ten Eyck, former commissioner of the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets at Albany, and Dr. C. E. Ladd, dean of the State College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

The coming event is already reported as attracting widespread interest among dairymen, farmers and their families in the western section of the state, and the estimated attendance of 10,000 is readily expected. A number of commercial concerns have already planned to be represented and will feature exhibits of interest to dairymen that reflect the importance of the dairy industry in Western New York.

Dr. Reed, featured speaker for the occasion, is a Missouri dairy farm boy who rose to prominence in the National farm picture after serving first as head of the dairy department at Kansas State College and later at Michigan State College. He has been in demand as a speaker on dairy herd improvement thruout the country.

Mr. TenEyck is well known to New York farm audiences. Since his retirement as state commissioner at Albany, he has returned to his farm where he is a prominent Guernsey breeder. His appearance on the program assures a practical message on farming in the Empire State.

Expressing his keen interest in the field day and the importance of dairying to the entire region, Dr. Ladd, dean of the state college at Cornell, praises the efforts of the various committees at work and the program they are developing. Of Dr. Reed, he says, "He is an able speaker, one who always has a message worth hearing. Dr. Reed has achieved national prominence because of his ability in the field of dairy industry."

The State Colleges of Agriculture and Veterinary Medicine are sponsoring exhibits for the field day on timely subjects, including one on mastitis, one on Bang's disease, and a third on dairy cattle feeding and breeding.

County Has Highest Tax Ratio in State

Assessing its real property at 99 per cent of full value, Allegany county leads New York State with the highest ratio of assessed to full value of taxable real property, according to the state equalization table for 1937 released by Mark Graves, commissioner of taxation and finance. Only one other county, Tioga, assesses at 99 per cent of full value. Only five others are in the nineties and the average ratio for the state is less than 85 per cent. The lowest ratio of assessed to full value among the Western New York counties is found in Cattaraugus, with 66. The lowest ratio in the entire state is Sullivan's 35.

Potato Field Day to be Held at Homer

The farm of one of the state's largest growers of certified seed potatoes is this year the scene of the eighth annual summer potato field day of the Empire State Potato Club. The farm is owned by Bruce Cottrell of Homer, Cortland county, and the date of the field day is Thursday, August 19th.

Plans are also under way for a demonstration in dusting potatoes both by airplane and autogiro.

Mr. Cottrell grows certified seed potatoes in short rotations, and has this year 85 acres planted largely with Green Mountains. One-half of this acreage is on his valley farm and the remaining half on a hill farm 500 feet higher. Last year this hill farm produced an average of more than 400 bushels of Green Mountains to the acre.
