## PRODUCERS-DEALERS SET AUGUST PRICES

About 50,000 Dairymen Are Now Members of Co-op. erative Milk Bargaining Agency.

Sixty-four associations consisting of about 50,000 milk producers are definitely contracted with the Met-ropolitan Co-operative Milk Produc-Propolitan Co-operative Milk Produc-ers Bargaining Agency, according to Charles H. Baldwin, executive sec-retary of the agency in his report to the board of dicetors at a meeting in Suragues July 29

While the majority of members are from New York State, the report showed that a considerable number snowed that a considerable number are from such nearby states as Ver-mont, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Connecticut, all pro-ducing milk for the metropolitan

area.

The price schedule agreed upon between producers and dealers at the Syracuse parley, for the month of August follows:

f August follows: fied price plan will pay \$2.00 a hundred pounds for milk for fluid distribution; \$1.85 for milk distributed as fluid cream; and a price based on regular formulas for manufactured milk products.

Distributors who operate country plants, or take entire outputs of the country plants operated by co-oper atives, will pay \$1.85 100 pounds.

Distributors who contract for fixed shipments of fluid milk will pay \$1.90 a hundred pounds.

Among the milk producers in this county affiliated with the Metropoli-tan Co-operative Milk Producers Bargaining Agency are those who deliver to plants in the following

communities:
Andover, Belfast, Belmont, Ciba, Fillmore, Houghton, Weller H. and Whitesville.


