The National Re-employment Service in Allegany county filled 71 jobs during the month of July, according to Norman J. Taube, NRS manager of Wellsville. Twelve of these jobs were in private industry while the remainder were in governmental service and public building and construction. The total report shows that these employment offices have placed 24.9 per cent more registered in private industry during July of this year than in July 1936 thruout the state.

Five bee inspectors are making their headquarters in Belmont. They are connected with the Department of Farms and Markets in Albany and are searching apiaries thruout the county for foul brood. This rapidly growing scourge affecting bee life is quite prevalent in this county and unless this disease is controlled at once not only the honey industry will be greatly affected, but the pollination so vital to fruits and crop production will suffer a heavy loss. This disease has been likened to infantile paralysis in humans. These inspectors are in the county on a most important mission and all owners, even the smallest number of hives should cooperate.

FAIR IS SWAMPED WITH MANY ENTRIES

Officials Claim the Largest Number of Competitors in History of County Fair This Year.

Angelica, Aug 24—Offices of the Allegany County Fair and Exhibition were literally swamped today with entries for the various competition which will be conducted during the ninety-third annual fair here during the first week in September, Wednesday through Saturday, it was learned today from Secretary L. L. Stillwell.

Since Monday, the unprecedented flood of competitors have been filling their petitions for the right to enter for awards, to bring about the largest list of competitors for premiums in history, he said. Tomorrow, Friday, Aug. 27th at five o'clock is the deadline for those wishing to enter in the various classifications.

As early as two weeks ago, Mr. Stillwell said that it was indicative that this year's entry list would exceed by far the total of previous years. Since then two subordinate secretaries have been kept busy answering inquiries and notifying others of acceptances. Monday a third secretary was called in to help with the answering of the letters and inquiries.

There are twenty-one divisions, dealing more specifically with agriculture, wherein cash premiums will be awarded winners. Besides these divisions or competitions, there will be prizes awarded each day in horse-racing, horsepulling contests and the Amateur Contest.

Among the agriculture and educational competitions are those for butter and cheese, butterfat contest, cattle division, culinary, egg show, farm products, fine arts, flowers, 4-H Club work, fruits, Future Farmers, Grange exhibits, honey, horse division, maple products, needlework, other domestic products, potatoes, poultry, school work and sheep.

Prizes also will be awarded for the best displays put on by commercial exhibitors. With twelve new booths completed this year and all reserved, making a total of thirty-four, competition here also will be the keenest ever. The Main Hall, aside from the new addition, has been completely remodeled.

The Second Annual Amateur Contest, which will be conducted each night with Grand Finals on Saturday night, has the largest number of entries in history. They will be conducted on a new basis of sectional competition with certain days allotted to contestants from different parts of the county and other sections of Western and Central New York. Eliminations will be held in the afternoon to determine the nine best, who will compete each of the first three evenings to decide the nine who will compete in the Grand Finals on Saturday.

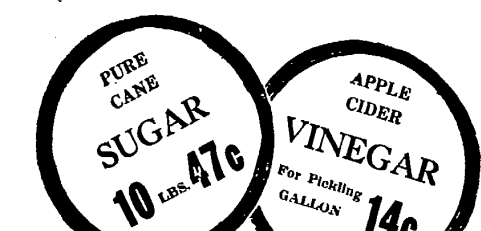
