J., typed at the rate of 129 net words per minute in the International Typewriting Contest at the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, Canada, on Saturday, August 22. This constitutes a new world's record under official International Contest Rules. Hossfeld set a tremendous pace on his Underwood, beating his previous record performance of 122 by four net words per minute. New records were also hung up by Grace Phelan of Elm, Pa., in the World's Amateur Championship, and by Margaret Faulkner of Toronto in the Canadian Amateur Championship.
