The Allegany County Federation of Women's Clubs will hold its 43rd annual meeting in Almond on Thursday, October 28. The meeting will be held at the Union church.

The federation has selected for its study topic this year "Crime Prevention," feeling that the situation in our country as respects crime is a challenge to every thinking mother and club woman. The program for the day will be built about this topic in an endeavor to promote interest and to provide practical material for the year's work. The fact that 200,000 children have passed thru Children's Courts in our country during the last two years, the majority under 19 years of age, is considered evidence that something is wrong in the home, the school or the community. The Federation, therefore, desires that every thinking woman face this situation and attempt some safeguard for her own children as well as the children of her community.

The Federation is sponsoring an essay contest among the students of the upper grades and high schools of the county. The subject will be some phase of crime prevention. The prizes will be awarded by the Hon. Ward M. Hopkins, judge of the Allegany County Court. This contest will close some time in the spring. The subjects for the essays will be announced at a future date.
