MOBILIZATION OF THOUGHT POWER

At the present time mobilization of war materials seems to be particularly popular with many nations, whether for the purpose of aggression or defense. This mobilization is, in most cases, well planued and systematic, so that it makes for the highest possible power and officiones on the part of the nations partab

Let us consider the possibility and Let us consider the possibility and desirability of transferring this same idea into another field the field of thought power. Cannot we, as individuals in our social setting, assuragrowth in the right type of thought growth in the right type of thought without prejudice or the use of propaganda. This can be done by stimulating, collecting, organizing and disseminating the type of thought that will make for the greatest growth toward a true democracy on the part of all nations. Such dithe part of all nations. Such di-recting is particularly necessary at this time, when many peoples upon the earth seem to show a tendency away from democracy--away from freedom and equality of individuals—away from the respect for the personality of individuals. Care must be taken that due consideration is given each individual and minority group lest they become dissatisfied and therefore become dangerous to a true democracy.

Mobilization of thought has been successfully accomplished along lines not leading on to prograss. Thru the building up of public opinion, our nation was drawn into the World War and now German and Italian war and now derman and tailing schools are moulding children's thoughts along lines that will lead to a greater unity and commoness of purpose within the nations involved, but it is doubtful whether this mobilization of thought is for the best of mankind as a whole

We conclude, then, that we should weigh opinions, ideas and thoughts as they come to us from outside or inside sources—select those that will make for the greatest growth of mankind in a desirable direction, and lead on to a stronger type of world democracy; and then, see that these ideas are spread over as wide a field as possible.
