ANDOVER WATER SUPPLY REPORT

completely rebuilt and new pipe lines laid to connect them. 4.—Infiltration galleries should be constructed to obtain the surface water, consisting of trenches with pipe in the bottom surrounded with sand and gravel, thus providing a filter to reduce turbidity. 5.—The road should be lowered and ditched so as to eliminate drainage from this source. 6.—The drainage line between the dams should be thoroly inspected and if necessary reconstructed. 7.—Rules should be adopted by the village for the protection of the water shed and enforced. The cost of this work as set forth in Exhibit "A" is estimated at \$12,765.00. For treating the water by filtration a slow sand filter with an average capacity of 200,000 gallons per day is recommended. This filter would consist of two basins enclosing sand filter beds with an operating gallery between. The structure would be built of concrete with a wood roof. For convenience, the Chlorinator could be moved to this new location. The estimated cost of the filter as set forth in Exhibit "B" amounts to \$16,832.00. Sketches showing the general layout and cross section of the filter are enclosed. As stated before, if the village must make a choice, the construction of the filter is recommended. The filter will effectively remove bacteria and turbidity, reduce the amount of chlorine required and assure the people of Andover with a good quality of water free from the dangers of chance pollution. Also future developments, particularly drilling for gas and oil, should be considered. Should such operations proceed in this neighborhood, the measures to secure sanitary protection of the water supply would be ineffective because of possible pollution of the underground water. At such time, it would then be necessary to expend additional money for protection or treatment. With filtration, all wear coming to the plant can be used, regardless of the source. In the other case, only the protected water can be used. No estimate has been made of the cost of inspecting and repairing the pipe line from the springs to the reservoir, as this can best be done with village forces. Respectfully submitted, WILLIAM S.
