VOTE "YES" On Amendment 4 During the past few months there has been a great deal of discussion regarding a proposed change in the New York Law which would permit a sheriff to succeed himself in office for consecutive terms. In such a discussion there seems but little to be said on the negative side. Why should a sheriff, any more than any other public officer, be refused by law the chance to carry on if his work is satisfactory? During his term, an efficient sheriff will have organized his department, become acquainted with conditions in his county and in many cases cleaned up undesirable conditions. If he is a good public official he will have gained the respect of law-abiding citizens as well as the respect of those elements who believe the law can be routed. The office of sheriff in this country is 121 years old and for some reason, which does not seem clear in the present day, the law creating this office particularly states that the sheriff cannot succeed himself for consecutive terms. For years this stipulation was not questioned but during the past few years, thinking persons have sought to determine any reason why such a stipulation should be continued. The man elected to the office of sheriff today fully realizes that he is just as responsible to the voters as is the county treasurer, the county clerk, the assemblyman, the governor or any other public official. Men of high calibre seek the office and in most cases in the state men of high calibre hold the office. Why, if the man you have chosen for sheriff for one term does his job well, would you not expect him to do just as well or better in succeeding terms? On November 2 you will go to the polls and under amendment No. 4 be asked to answer "yes" or "no" on the following question: "Shall the proposed amendment to Section 1, Article 10 of the Constitution, in relation to the eligibility of sheriffs to succeed themselves be approved?" It is well, for your own good and the good of your county, to consider this question carefully, and make it possible for the efficient sheriff to continue in office as long as he serves you well.
