Why should a sheriff, any more than any other public officer, be refused by law the chance to carry on if his work is satisfactory? During his term, an efficient sheriff will have organized his department, become acquainted with conditions in his county and in many cases cleaned up undesirable conditions. If he is a good public official he will have gained the respect of law-abiding citizens as well as the respect of those elements who believe the law can be


