TWO children, both of them from the grades in the Andover school, came near meeting their Waterloo one day this week, one by a car and the other by one of the many gasoline trucks going thru the village. And neither the truck driver nor the operator of the car would have been held responsible for the death of the youngsters as they dashed across the street without giving a glance either way. But they would have been just as dead, regardless of where the blame was placed.

It made us think of the fine practice the schools of Rochester and Buffalo have in regard to this forgetfulness on the part of the children. These cities, and others, have what they call "Patrols," that is, boys picked from each of the grades, furnished with belts similar to the Army "Sam Brown" belt and who have charge of the children from their grade at all intersections, crosswalks and other places during the noon recess and after school.

Due to the congestion around the Andover school afternoons with the school buses, cars, trucks, etc., and with no school stop light to control the fast traffic going up Elm street, this would be a mighty fine thing for the young fellows of the lower grades—and do they think they're the big "IT" when they lead a group of their playmates across "or stop some smaller child from dashing into the street without looking either way.

Think it over, Prof. and perhaps a good workable plan can be arranged for Andover pupils. Slippery and icy pavements make it all the more hazardous and one life saved would more than compensate for all the effort ever expended on such a project.

CONGRATULATIONS are in order to the Republican victors in the local election Tuesday. The "little national election" is over and we now look forward to the harmony so necessary in a town of Andover.
