## Cuba Pastor Gives Paper on Nazism at Ministers Meeting

The Rev. Claire Malcomson, pastor of the First Baptist church of Cuba, was essayist at the November meeting of the Allegany County Ministers Association held in the Howe Memorial library at Wellsville Monday, Nov. 8th.

Mr. Molcomson in his paper gave a summary of the growth of Nazism and the outstanding characteristics of the movement today. In regard to the situation of Protestant churches in Germany he said that they are quite generally controlled by the Hitler government, therefore are nationalistic in outlook and program.
