 Notice is hereby given that a SPECIAL ELECTION will be held in the Village Hall, Andover, New York on the 23rd day of November, 1937 between the hours of 1:00 o'clock and 6:00 o'clock in the afternoon of that day. That at such election the following proposition is to be voted upon:  
 "Shall the Andover Village Board be authorized to clean out its springs, re-cement them and build infiltration galleries for the purpose of improving and increasing the water supply of our Village and make such additional improvements thereof and purchase such additional supplies and equipment and property pertaining thereto as it may deem necessary and issue and sell bonds upon the faith and credit of said Village as may be necessary in order to pay the costs and expenses thereof in an amount not to exceed Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00)?
