THANKSGIVING

At this particular season of the year emphasis is placed upon the first successful year of our Mayflower ancestors in the new world. The last Thursday of November has been set aside as a national holiday throughout the United States in their honor.

It is almost impossible to visualize crude saws chewing trees to be used in log houses, the rubbing of stones to hollow out utensils, the killing of any wild game for food, and the rude spinning wheel, bone needles, and pieces of hide a thread in the making of clothing. These early settlers had few, if any domestic animals so the crops were produced by hand labor, a slow, hard method. All the deprivations were accepted, however, for their ancestors of our consider them preferable in perspective and not too big a price to pay for a better freedom. So they continued to struggle along against great odds, such as starvation, the hostility of the Indians, failure of crops and other disadvantages of this new unexplored and dangerous land.

Special treats such as pumpkin pie, wild turkey and duck, deer, and wild pig made everyone's mouth water. After the feast it is believed songs were sung and thanks offered to the Holy One.

Bear in mind that altho Thanksgiving is a time for home-gathering, it is also a time to look back on the work of the Mayflower voyagers and not take it for granted that things just happen to be provided for our generation. With our new ease and plenty, we are drifting away from the trend of the Mayflower fathers who looked to God with praise and prayers.

Juniors Score Success in Play

The Junior Class of Andover High School scored a huge success in their first production, "Yimmie Yonson's Yob," which was presented to the public on Thursday and Friday nights, Nov. 18-19.

The title character, Yimmie Yonson, played by Jack Saunders was a difficult one to play, and was very ably performed. The big Swede from "Mannassota" won the audience by the naturalness and spontaneity of his acting. The difficult character role, Mrs. Kent, the mother, played by Charlotte Coryell merits praise because of the authenticity of its interpretation by Charlotte. Various things which added substantially to the enjoyment of the play were the whimsical and appealing sweetness of Edna Honegger as Kittie, the delightful brogue and gestures of Teresa Burns as Peg, the Irish cook; Louis Fulkerson's sternness as a detective and bashfulness as the sweetheart of Kittie. Laura Backus as Sylvia, the scheming niece was excellent. Clyde Briggs as Frank, a partner in Sylvia's schemes; Charles Spicer, the farm hand court-ing Peg; Montrose Green, the stern uncle, and Bethel Millsbaugh, the sweet and dutiful stepdaughter merit praise for the ability with which they portrayed their respective roles.

Both the directing of the play and its grouping and staging were well planned and well executed by the co-directors, Prin. and Mrs. Glenn E. Bretsch who deserve a great deal of credit for its success. Much time and effort were given by them to insure its being effectively staged and acted.
