To Celebrate Founders Day at Houghton College

Convocation Part of the College Home-Coming, Saturday. Program to Honor Dr. J. S. Luckey.

On Saturday morning, November 27th at 10 o'clock, a convocation celebrating Founders Day will be held at Houghton College. Founders Day convocation is an annual tradition at Houghton College. The program for this year is planned as a memorial to Dr. James S. Luckey, former president who died April 7, 1937.

Two addresses will be given. Dr. Paul H. Fall, alumnus of Houghton College, Professor of chemistry at Williams College, Williamstown, Mass., speaks on "James S. Luckey, the Builder." Dr. Ferdinand Carlos Ferry, retiring president at Hamilton College, Clinton, N. Y., will give an educational address. Dr. Ferry during his past educational career, studied not only in the best of American universities but in the Universities of Christians, in Norway, Berlin, Leipzig, and Göttingen in Germany. From 1902-1917, Dr. Ferry served as professor of mathematics and college dean at Williams College and from 1917 until now, he has served as professor, trustee and president of Hamilton College. During this time he also has been a member of the National Committee on Standards of Colleges and Secondary Schools of the Middle Atlantic Association of Colleges and the National Association of Colleges and Universities. These are but a few of the outstanding positions he has held during his long scholarly career as a foremost American educator.

The Houghton College orchestra will play the professional marches and the college choir will sing a group of three numbers. Rev. Joseph R. Pitt, pastor of the Wesleyan Methodist church in East Aurora, former college pastor for 17 years, will have a part in the program.

There will be representatives at this convocation from the New York State Department of Education at Albany, and from the New York State Colleges.

Founders Day Convocation is a part of the home-coming events of the week-end of November 26, 27, 28. On Friday afternoon from 3:15 to 5:15 a tea will be given the alumni in Gayadeo Hall and in the evening an alumni basketball game will be played in Bedford gymnasium. The events of Saturday are: Founders Day convocation at 10 a. m., alumni luncheon at noon; alumni board meeting at 1:30; open house at the college dormitories from 3 to 5; alumni dinner at 6:30 and at 8:15 a program given by the alumni depicting various stages in the development of the college since its beginning in 1884.

The Sunday services will be in charge of the college pastor, Rev. E. W. Black.
