## Andover Receives State Praise for Attendance Record

Andover High School was one of the 18 scholas in the State having an enrollment between 300 and 399 that received special mention in the State Bulletin to Schools for having maintained an attendance record of 96 per cent or better during the 1936-37 school year. Andover's attendance was 96.2% as compared with the State average of 94.35%.

Andover High School has always made a special effort to have pupils in school unless legal reasons keep them from attending. The quality of work that a pupil can do in school is greatly affected by absence, particularly the half day or day at a time type, for usually the pupil makes little effort to make up work lost, and in many cases it is very difficult to do so.

The attendance record for the current year to date is 97 per cent.

## Blackfriars Sponsor Successful Play

The Blackfriars, Andover High's new dramatic club, which was organized this year under the direction of Miss Josephine Cappuccilli, was very successful in its initial production which was put on in assembly Wednesday, Nov. 23. The play chosen, "Grandma Pulls a String," was an excellent selection, as proved by the enthusiasm with which it was received.

The leading role, Grandma, portrayed by Katherine Barber, was unusually well interpreted. Grandma dominated the play from the moment her querulous, high-pitched voice was heard offstage, issuing orders and demanding attention. Eleanor Northrup, as Hildegard, was adorable and captivating in her role as the little sister so very anxious for everything to go well in her older sister's love affair.

The play was a success due to the excellent acting of the cast, the excellent production, and the excellent directing of Miss Cappuccilli.

Andover's purple Panthers were defeated by Canisteo's flashing Tigers November 23rd, at Canisteo. In the first quarter Louis Fulkerson, Henry Antan, Montrose Greene, Charles Burgett and Gerald Dolan managed to keep ahead of the Tigers by their good passing and ability to shoot baskets.

In the second quarter Bill Dugan, Don Hardy, Henry Antan, George Joyce and Clyde Briggs kept the ball going, and didn't get it thru the basket many times, letting Canisteo take the half.

During the third and fourth quarters the two teams stayed neck and neck until about 15 or 20 seconds before the whistle blew to end the game, when the Tigers made a basket, making it nearly impossible for Andover to catch up. When the whistle blew the score was 19-21 in favor of Canisteo.

Brazil, the largest South American country, has recently adopted a form of government similar to fascism. Vargas is the dictator under this new form of government which has been taking shape for the past two years. It is significant because it is indicative of present world trends in government.

Fascism is the greatest foe of Democracy. Three of the most powerful Fascist countries, Germany, Italy and Japan, have signed an alliance which may involve many European nations and also some of the South American. The outstanding characteristic of Fascism is the power of the state with one man as the official spokesman. Under its rule, workers are granted certain rights for which they are obliged to make great returns in service to the state.

## Teachers Hear Noted Men at Conference

At the opening of the fall teachers' conference Monday morning, Nov. 29, at the Wellsville High School auditorium, two noted men, Dr. Stephen W. Paine, president of Houghton College, and Dr. Joseph Seidlin, director of the School of Education at Alfred University, addressed the 700 teachers who were present.

In Dr. Paine's talk, "Character in Education," he stressed the need of religion in effective character training. Discussing numerous character building plans endorsed by leading educators, Dr. Paine emphasized the fact that none of them included the religious training which he considers so imperative.

Dr. Seidlin, the second speaker of the opening session, in his address, "Sensationalism in Education," pointed out that teachers should keep an open mind, but should not lose a balanced point of view, and should develop a sales resistance to catch words and phrases in the educational world, in other words, sensationalism in education. He said also that changes in methods of education should be carefully and conscientiously considered before being imposed. He made it emphatic that every teacher should continue studying and should keep abreast of the times.

Tuesday afternoon Dean John W. Withers of New York University School of Education addressed the entire conference on the theme, "Education Looks Forward." Dean Withers dwelt at length on the philosophy of education and showed that educators are planning programs now to suit the changes taking place in the nature of students in our schools.

At a luncheon meeting Monday noon, Nov. 29, at the Hotel Fassett in Wellsville, the principals and faculty advisors of journalism of the Allegany county schools furthered plans for a press association to be composed of student representatives from the staffs of the school papers.

It is expected that a great deal of benefit to the students and to their journals will result from this opportunity for an exchange of ideas and from the social contact with other pupils outside their own school.
