Wants Suggestions For Legislation To Promote Safety

Senator Desmond Asks for Suggestions as to New Laws That Would Promote Highway Safety.

Readers of this paper are asked by State Senator Thomas C. Desmond, of Orange County, for suggestions from their personal experience regarding possible new legislation to promote highway safety. He states that he is already planning to introduce, when the legislature meets again in January, bills to require:
1. All motor vehicles to stop at railroad crossings which have been designated as dangerous by the Superintendent of Public Works.
2. All applicants for drivers' license to submit a physician's statement that they are in satisfactory physical condition to operate a motor vehicle.
"Enactment of this legislation," Desmond declared, "will result in a reduction of the appalling number of deaths and injuries which occur each year either in accidents at railroad crossings or in accidents elsewhere caused by drivers in unfit physical condition."
"During the first eight months of 1937, there were nearly 100 accidents at railroad crossings in New York State. Such accidents can be greatly reduced, if all drivers are required to come to a full stop at dangerous crossings.
"Drivers who are physically unfit to operate motor vehicles are potential killers. Doctors and automobile experts agree that many accidents resulting in serious injuries or death will be prevented by enacting legislation of all license applicants."
Senator Desmond said that he welcomes advice regarding his proposed legislation and further highway safety suggestions from residents of this district, who may write to him at the State Capitol, Albany, New York.
