In the third quarter the first group brought the score up to 21, still giving Almond no chance to score. Substitutions of less experienced players were made, Almond scoring three points, and at the end of the third quarter the score was 21-3. The second group went back for the fourth quarter and brought the score up to 30. Almond scored an additional six points, bringing the final score 30-9 in Andover's favor.
