Liquid Air Demonstration In Assembly

Professor Paul Saunders of Alfred University gave his well known liquid air demonstration in Assembly Friday morning. Grades five through twelve attended the assembly.

Professor Saunders, after explaining that liquid air is composed of nitrogen, oxygen and carbon dioxide, demonstrated the extremity of the coldness with several very interesting experiments such as dropping various articles into the container holding the liquid air. The result was that even the softest were made as hard as rock in a very short space of time. He pointed out the various properties of liquid air and demonstrated each of them.

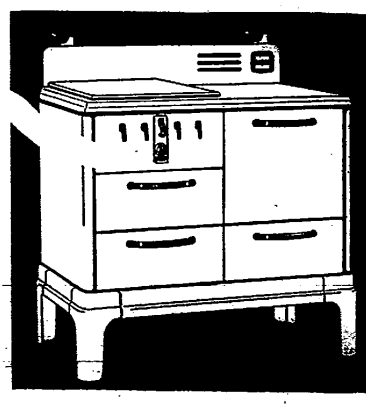
