More Bushels on **Protected Soils**

Potato Yields Found to be Greater on Lands Guarded From Erosion.

From ten to 36 more bushels of potatoes to the acre have been grown on lands protected from soil erosion than on unprotected plots.

This was learned at the soil erosion experiment station at Arnot, N. Y., from experiments extending ver three years and conducted both by the Soil Conservation Service and the New York State College of Agriculture.

Dr. John Lamb, supervis experiment station, says these re-sults verify unofficial reports from farmers and technicians in the state's nine soil conservation areas who say that cutting down losses of soil, water, and fertilizer by contour farming has increased yields.
