Ohio Has New Truck Regulation

Albany, Jan. 16.—Owners of New York State trucks which operate in Ohio will be required to comply with a new regulation of that state, according to Carroll E. Mealey, commissioner of motor vehicles.

Commissioner Mealey announced that he had been advised by Ohio authorities of a law which requires the display, on the side of all commercial vehicles, of information showing tire width, carrying capacity and actual weight of the vehicle. The notice from Ohio points out

that all commercial vehicles operating in that state, regardless of the state of ownership or registration, must meet the requirements.
