John P. Herrick establishes Two More Scholarships

Makes a Total of Memorial Scholarships Founded by Him at Alfred University.

Establishing two more scholarships at Alfred University, John P. Herrick of Orleans, a trustee of the university, has founded a total of two in memory of Rev. C. W. Herrick (died 1898) of Andover, who memorialized Dr. J. H. Herrick (died 1929) of Andover, Pa.

Rev. Fairbanks was a politician, his first opponent a slave having come to the state from the Ohio.

He carried the negro to the river and landed him at Detroit, a successful fact.

At another time Mr. Fairbanks had a slave girl, only four years old, and gave her freedom. He freed 47 slaves.

Dr. Charles Dodd, a Baptist minister, was born in Andover, N. Y., 1859. He graduated from Andover University and received a Ph.D. degree from the University of Divinity from the University of Divinity.

He conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity at Westport, N. Y.; Newark, N. J.; and Germantown, Md.; and the last years of his life at the home of his sister, Mrs. Coudersport.

These scholarships carry a value of \$300 except for 1939-40 when it is only \$200. The last year of his life at the home of his sister, Mrs. Coudersport.
