 In the matter of the Petition of Val M. Kastner, 80 Preston Road, Buffalo, N. Y., Notice is hereby given, pursuant to Section 153, Article IV of the Conservation Law, that the CONSERVATION DEPARTMENT will meet at the State Office Building in the City of Buffalo, on the 18th day of March, 1939, at 2:00 o'clock, standard time in the afternoon of that day for the purpose of hearing all persons who may be affected by a determination of the Conservation Department that additional protection of fish and game or prohibition of the taking of such species as specified in said petition is required.

The grounds of such application are substantially as follows: Danger of extermination of trout in the Viscoy and East Koy in Allegany and Wyoming counties. It is proposed to hear evidence on the advisability of shortening the open season, reducing the daily bag limit to five trout per person per day, and increasing the minimum size limit for the taking of such fish.

Farm and Home Week Is Well Attended

New Record is Set for Week. Nearly 15,000 Persons Register; 500 Events on Program.

With an official registration of 14,885, Cornell's 32nd annual Farm and Home Week is believed to have established an all-time record high for attendance.

The figures must still be checked to remove all duplicate registrations. The total last year was 14,111.

Officials of the college of agricul-

ture say that most of the 500 events on this year's program were well attended, and a choice of as many as 20 different events in a single hour was offered visitors. An accurate count is kept on the various meetings to see if attendance warrants a similar meeting the following year.

To help run things smoothly, more than 300 students on eight committees worked all week. Their help was invaluable, says Professor Ralph Wheeler, veteran of 32 Farm and Home Weeks and director of 30.

Visitors requested nearly 48,000 bulletins from the colleges of agriculture and home economics during the week. By far, the bulletins on homemaking were the most popular. Among farmers, most demands

were for bulletins on farm crops, livestock, poultry, and farm engineering. According to the mailing room, this is the largest number of publications and printed matter ever given out during the week.
