Sheep Raising Becoming More Popular

Aide-Diversified Farming In State Says Prof. J. P. Willman of the College of Agriculture at Ithaca.

Sheep-raising is gaining in popularity in New York State as farmers turn toward a more diversified farm program, according to Professor J. P. Willman of the State College of Agriculture who says sheep are well suited to many sections. A century ago New York was a leader in sheep-raising.

Many persons hesitate to enter this branch of farming, he says, because they know little about sheep or because of their interpretation of statistics.

"The fact that New York has fewer sheep today than 75 years ago does not prove the lack of possibilities today. In the early days, sheep were raised largely for their wool, and many farmers found other enterprises more profitable.

"A number of farmers have gone back to raising sheep and have been successful in producing lambs and wool, while others have failed. Many of the failures have been due to improper feeding, poor management, and failure to combat parasites.

"If a farmer understands sheep, likes them, and enjoys working with them, he will be successful as a sheep breeder."

Sheep have certain advantages, says Professor Willman. They are able to graze and do well on land unfit for the plow and unsuited for grazing by other animals. They prefer high and dry ground and do not require expensive buildings or equipment. Thus, large areas that cannot be used profitably for other agricultural purposes may furnish excellent grazing land.

Raymond Higgins of Canaseraga was elected chairman by the 28 enrolled members owning purebred Holsteins; Robert Totten of Cuba chairman of the 14 members owning purebred Ayrshires; Ronald Smith of Fillmore chairman of the 14 members owning purebred Guernseys, and Joe Kelly of Friendship, chairman of the eight members owning purebred Jerseys. These chairmen have been requested to outline a series of activities to be followed in the interest of their breed groups.

The next meeting of the Allegany County Dairy Club will be held at the Allegany county farm at Angelica on Saturday, April 8th, when the State livestock specialist H. A. Willman will supervise a series of contests and demonstrations. Leo Johannes, herdsman at the county farm, will give information to the group relative to the breeding program now being followed with this outstanding Jersey herd.
