Purple and White Wins Easy Game Over Friendship 6-1

The Andover high school baseball team slugged its way to an easy 6-1 victory over a purple and gold Friendship nine last Friday night on the latter's field.

Marking their third win of the season, the local boys played tight errorless ball behind the pitching of "Montie" Greene. In the third inning, Rice drove out a single to score the first run by Bud Dolan. Clyde Briggs stole the spotlight of the encounter by swatting out a homer into deep right field in the fourth inning. Andover's following streak of hits, led by Dolan with two hits out of four times up, drove in runs enough to almost assure a victory by the sixth inning. Briggs hit for six bases out of four trips to the plate.

Greene pitched shutout ball, allowing but three hits, until the final frame when a Friendship man connected for a home with none aboard. This game is the third win out of four starts. Summary:
