

other states? A.—The law makes no provision I for such licenses; nor is there any real necessity for them. The New York State law provides for "limited reciprocity." That is, New York State gives to the non-resident motorist the same privileges with respect to the use of registrations and driving licenses as the home state of the non-resident grants to New York motorists, provided the visitor continues his residence in another state, and provided further, that he does not operate an automobile for hire or profit between points in New York state. The rule is also sub-

ject to the provision that all such non-resident operators must be at least 18 years of age. Q.—What is the maximum speed limit in New York State? A.—There is no absolute speed limit in New York State. The law does provide, however, that speed by any motor vehicle other than a
