Allegany County to Have Deer Season

With the passage of the Stoke Bill by both the House and Senste, it is practically a certainty that Allegany county will have an open deer season next fall.

The bill proposes an open seaso The bill proposes an open selses on buck deer from November 21 to November 30 with the exception of the intervening Sunday, when the deer hunting will be allowed. First-arms are restricted to slugs or single balls fired from shotguns.

Counties included in the new deer hunting area are Resource Contain.
