## Co-operative Sheep Dipping

Assistant County Farm Bureau Manager Clifford R. Harrington, has been operating a co-operative sheep dipping service for the first time in Allegany county this year.

The project is carried out on a co-operative cost basis using a portable tank transported from farm to farm. Sheep can be dipped at a rate of 400 a day and a total of 2,000 sheep are expected to be treated for control of lice, ticks, etc.
