## DISH FOR THIS WEEK

A delicious dessert that's hearty enough for a man, yet simple enough for youngsters, is this steamed pudding, "Lemon Snowballs."

**Lemon Snowballs**

1 cup of sifted flour  
1 teaspoon of baking powder  
¼ teaspoon of salt  
3 eggs, separated  
1 cup of granulated sugar  
3 tablespoons of water  
1 teaspoon of grated lemon rind  
2 tablespoons of lemon juice  
Powdered sugar.  
Mix and sift the flour, baking powder and salt. Beat the egg yolks, and add the granulated sugar gradually to them, beating until the mixture is thick and light. Then add the water, lemon rind and juice; stir in the flour and fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites.

Fill greased custard cups two-thirds full; tie greased paper over the tops and steam for 30 minutes. When done, turn the pudding from the cups, roll it in powdered sugar, and serve with lemon or any other fruit sauce.

For a Sunday or "company" dinner, the New York State College of Home Economics suggests: Roast breast of lamb, buttered fluffy rice, green snap beans, orange salad with mint French dressing, buttered finger rolls, lemon snowballs, milk for the children and coffee or milk for the grown-ups.
