Milk Regulation Resumed In State July 1st

Commissioner Noyes
Warns Against Over
Production of Milk
Market Becomes Stagnant

Regulation of prices paid to milk producers supplying milk to New York metropolitan market resumed on July 1 by New York State and the Federal Government.

Commissioner Holton V. Noyes of the State Department of Agriculture and Markets issued the announcement after the United States Supreme Court reversed its previous decision of District Court Judge.

"Marketing orders fixing minimum prices to be paid for milk sold in the New York metropolitan and Niagara Frontier markets will be re-established. We are able to put the price regulation back into effect at this early date because of the Federal Department of Agriculture, anticipating a decision by the United States Supreme Court, have been for such an eventuality weeks. "This announcement encouraging news to State dairymen. It means that prices they have received for the past few months will be restored and stability will be restored to the market."

"The experience of months since price regulation was invalidated should be proof of the necessity for regulation in this industry. Conditions, chaotic and federal orders because of the fall, immediately stop farmers' returns in expansion of control last year's decisions of the market and starvation of farmers' milk."

"The sweeping favor by the United States Supreme Court upholding the interstate agreement has been followed by Governor Lehman-Nolan-Allyn bill correct constitutional defects in control act. "The warning against the Lehman in approving the Allen bill should be heeded. They must realize regulation alone will not solve the problem. Although satisfaction may be established under control plan, nothing in the marketing order will help dealers or consumers more milk than their own.
