and not put my feet on the ground. I decided to sleep in my clothes, for it had become very chilly. Well, I thought, everything's all right so far. No sooner had I thought this when my cot, with a great squeaking and crashing collapsed to the ground. With great fuming, I managed to set it up and, after sitting down gingerly, again prepared for sleep. After about ten minutes dozing I was awakened by something buzzing around inside my tent. If there is anything I hate and fear, it's bugs. I quickly pulled the covers over my head. I had to come up for air sometime, so I decided I had better try to kill the "thing" before I went mad. From the moonlight coming in my tent, I could see the bug flying around. At last, after spending a hectic half hour trying to kill it, it alighted on my bed and I crushed it with my shoe. Again I lay down. Some owl or bird was calling weirdly from the other side of the lake. He kept it up and I felt the hair stand up on the back of my neck. Letting my imagination run wildly thru every channel of thought, I pictured the most horrible things happening to me out in that God-forsaken spot. As the cold light of dawn crept up from the eastern hills, I was still awake in a cold sweat.

My brother, coming in my tent at 6 o'clock suggested a morning dip. I struggled into my bathing suit and after a half hour of swimming in freezing water, dressed again. My clothes were very wrinkled from having slept in them. My bones and muscles ached from having slept on a hard cot. I had been bitten by pesky mosquitoes and I was tired, desperately tired from not having slept all night.

Tired, cold and miserable I demanded that my father take me home. So I went home feeling thankful and yet, a little ashamed

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because I hadn't been able to take my first night in camp.

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
