

At the seventh annual last year. At the seventh annual meeting of the Association of Towns held in Albany last February, the 600 justices of peace in attendance considered the recommendations ad vanced by the Special Committee of Justices of Peace. an overwhelming vote.
The members of the executive committee of the Association of Towns, however, took the position that changes in the justice court should be brought about gradually rather than suddenly. Legislation was, therefore, introduced in recent Legislature to bring nly two of the changes app e justices of peace.

The first provides for a simplified

system of compensation for justices of peace, based upon the number of days required by a trial or pro-ceeding, but limited to three days compensation in a single case. Backus bill, which embodies these changes was passed by the Legisla. ture and approved by the Governor as Chapter 737. It becomes effective on July 1st, next.
