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Pupils Have Excellent Regents Record

A study of the results of the Regents examinations in Andover High School this June shows that 96.6% of the papers written received a passing mark. In high school subjects there were a total of 204 papers written and of these 197 have been marked as passing and sent to the State Education Department for final review.

In the Preliminary Regents there were 141 papers written and 131 received a passing mark. These numbers include those written by pupils who came from rural schools to take the examinations.
