always willing to lend books if the privilege is not abused.

After the book is selected and you start reading, skip pages if you want to. It is a real art to be able to skim through a book and still know what you have read. It is like a new sport in which skill is acquired through practice.

I would like to quote a short poem that Carl Sandburg once wrote.

If I had a million lives to live
And a million deaths to die,
In a million humdrum worlds
I wouldn't want the same name
Or the same house number
Each time I came back again."

We have but one life to live, but through enthusiastic reading, we may find ourselves really living the lives of the people of whom we are reading and doing the things they are doing.

Yet like a certain water insect who chooses building materials here and there, the reader instinctively selects from the outspread world of books, the building materials for the house of his soul. He chooses and rejects, remembers and forgets more than he remembers. Except when our reading is directed toward some special study, accuracy of memory is not important.

In recent years, movies have come to take the place of books for some people. However, in a true sense movies are but a supplement to books. When a movie is seen after reading the book, it helps to impress the main points on the mind of the reader and when the movie is seen first, it creates a desire to read the book. Books can be picked up and read again after a first reading while it is practically impossible to refer again to a movie for certain points of interest in the story.

In one evening one can visualize and really live Halliburton's thrilling experiences such as running around Mt. Olympus, crossing the Alps on an elephant and climbing Mt. Fujiyama.

When reading Richard E. Byrd's recent book, "Alone" one can almost feel the extreme cold of 70 degrees below zero and experience the feeling of being so near death's door, alone.

There is no exaggeration in calling books "buried treasure." They have proved to be a treasure more lasting and more enriching in life than buried gold. When friends and money are gone, books linger on to comfort and enrich lives.

And as Mr. Parma, a collector for the Library of Congress, once said, "Books are like people, the best ones are very simple on the outside but hidden within are riches that may be exquisitely elaborate."

The word valedictory will always mean bidding farewell and even though the time has come to bid farewell to our high school life, I hope we will always keep the friendships we have made here and that we will continue to make new ones.
