Question-Does the Vehicle and Traffic Law place any restrictions on

the actions of pedestrians?

Answer—Yes. In the interest of with electricity, gas, safety, there are laws which, while Modern conveniences. restricting the activities of pedestrians, were enacted for the protec-tion of the walking public.

Q .-- Should pedestrians obey traf-

trolled by traffic control signals. Of course, when a pedestrian has started on the green light and the signal changes to red, the motorist is obliged to yield the right of way.

Q.—How should the pedestrian cross at intersections where there is no method of traffic control.

A .-- At intersections where there no regulated traffic control, the motorist is required to yield the right of way, but this in no way re-lieves the pedestrian from exercising due care for his safety.

Q.-Should pedestrians use nels or overhead crossings if they are provided?

A.—Yes.
