KNOW YOUR LAW

Below are presented some questions and answers on the subject of the Vehicle and Traffic Law and rules of the road. Readers are invited to submit questions to Information Service, Bureau of Motor Vehicles, Albany, N. Y.

Question—Does the Vehicle and Traffic Law place any restrictions on the actions of pedestrians?

Answer—Yes. In the interest of safety, there are laws which, while restricting the activities of pedestrians, were enacted for the protection of the walking public.

Q.—Should pedestrians obey traffic control signals?

A.—Yes. Pedestrians should cross only on the green signal at intersections, where traffic is controlled by traffic control signals. Of course, when a pedestrian has started on the green light and the signal changes to red, the motorist is obliged to yield the right of way.

Q.—How should the pedestrian cross at intersections where there is no method of traffic control.

A.—At intersections where there is no regulated traffic control, the motorist is required to yield the right of way, but this in no way relieves the pedestrian from exercising due care for his safety.

Q.—Should pedestrians use tunnels or overhead crossings if they are provided?

A.—Yes.

Q.—What does the law say concerning crossing of streets at points other than intersections?

A.—In crossing streets other than at intersections, pedestrians are required to yield the right of way to vehicles, but the motorist is not relieved from the duty of exercising due care for the safety of pedestrians.

Q.—What is the proper way to walk along a highway?

A.—Pedestrians are required to walk facing traffic. This is a provision of the law. The Bureau of Motor Vehicles further recommends that at night pedestrians carry a light or a white object, such as a handkerchief, and that they yield the right of way upon the approach of an automobile.

Q.—What does the new headlight law require of the driver of a car with regard to meeting and passing approaching vehicles, and with re-

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guard to driving in lighted areas?

A.—The new law, which went into effect July 1, prohibits the use of the upper beam of headlamps when meeting and passing oncoming vehicles and while driving in lighted areas. The operator, in these circumstances, is required to switch to the lower beam. In the case of an approaching vehicle, the switch must be made when the oncoming vehicle is within 500 feet.

Q.—What is meant by "dimming?"

A.—The law does not define "dimming." In common usage, the term may mean one of two things: either the use of parking lights or the operation of switching headlamps from the upper to the lower beam. Prior to the advent of multiple beam headlamps, dimming referred to turning off the headlamp beam and switching to "dim" or parking lights. This is dangerous and is not required in modern practice because use of the lower beam of headlamps should eliminate glare. Use of this lower beam of the headlamps cannot accurately be described as "dimming," however, because the lower beam does not throw less light than the upper beam; it simply tilts the light beams downward.

Q.—What are "parking lights?"

A.—Parking lights are the lights on the front of the car required by law to be lighted when the car is parked. These lights, which may be described accurately as "dim" lights may be in the headlamps, on the cowl or on the fenders of your car.
