

At attractive dessert at any time, and one especially delicious at this time of year when there is an abundance of fresh fruit of all kinds, a Fruit Tarts Make pastry shells of plain or

puff paste, with the inner part a little larger than the half of a peach. When these are baked, place a generous amount of fruit mixture i the center of each. If fresh fruit is used, it should be thoroly ripe and sweetened with powdered sugar. Whipped cream may be used on top, if desired.

For special occasions, baskets may e made by putting a handle on the tart. To make handles, place strips the paste over a quarter-poun baking powder tim, to insure the proper curve. When they are baked, anchor the handle between the pieces of fruit. The pastry shells may be made

the day before serving. For a Sunday or "special" dinner using fruit tarts for dessert, the New State College of Home Economics suggests: Chicken and chicken gra baking powder biscuits, mashed sweet or white potatoe (buttered peas, a crisp green salaf greens and tomatoes, milk for the children, and coffee, tea or mil for the grown-ups.
