KNOW YOUR LAW

Below are presented some questions and answers on the subject of the Vehicle and Traffic Law and rules of the road. Readers are invited to submit questions to Information Service, Bureau of Motor Vehicles, Albany, N. Y.

Question—How may a junior operator's license be obtained?

Answer—To obtain a junior operator's license, the applicant must be between 16 and 18 years of age. Proof of age must be furnished through submission of a birth, baptismal or school certificate. In addition, necessity of the license must be shown for one of the following purposes: (a) In traveling to and from school, (b) In the usual and ordinary pursuit of the business of the parent, guardian or the person with whom the applicant actually lives and resides.

Q.—Is it necessary for the parent, guardian or person with whom the applicant lives to sign the application for the license?

A.—Yes. The affidavit attached to the application must be signed and sworn to by the parent, guardian or person with whom the applicant lives.

Q.—Are there any restrictions placed on the junior operator?

A.—Yes. A junior operator cannot drive at any time within the limits of the City of New York. He cannot operate a bus carrying children.

AROUND OUR HOUSE

Removing Fruit Stains

Fresh-fruit season to many homemakers means not only canning but more fruit stains than usual on clothes and table linen. The New York State College of Home Economics offers these suggestions:

Most fresh-fruit stains in cotton and linens can be removed if treated while fresh. Place the stained portion over a bucket on the floor, then pour boiling water thru the stain from a height of three or four feet. The force of the water drives out the stain. Do not use soap, as soap sets the stain.

Dry fruit stains are more difficult to remove but should be treated in the same way as a moist stain. If fruit stains are old or the material has been laundered, they may be bleached with Javelle water or with potassium permanganate and oxalic acid. (Oxalic acid and potassium permanganate are poisons and should be so marked and kept in a safe place.)

Another method for old stains is to rub the stain well with glycerine, let this stand for several hours, then pour boiling water thru the stain from a height of three or four feet. Oxalic acid and ammonia used alternately are often effective for old stains.

Another method for white cotton and linen fabrics is to boil the stained material in heavy soda to which peroxide or hydrogen has been added, using one tablespoon of peroxide of hydrogen to one gallon of soda. Bring the soda to a boil before adding the peroxide. Then add the stained material and boil it for ten or 15 minutes. If stains such as peach, pear, and plum do not disappear, add another tablespoon of peroxide of hydrogen to each gallon of water and boil the material again.

dren to and from school, nor operate a motor vehicle except the vehicle owned by him, his parent, guardian or the person with whom he actually resides. Further, he cannot instruct others to drive, nor can he drive as a chauffeur. He cannot operate a motor vehicle at any time except for the purposes for which he obtained his license. In addition, he cannot drive or operate between the hours of 6 p. m. and 7 a. m. Eastern Standard Time from September 1 to April 30, inclusive, nor between the hours of 7:30 p. m. and 4:30 a. m., from May 1 to August 31, inclusive, unless accompanied by his parent, guardian or person with whom he resides.

Q.—Will violation of any sort of the above rules result in any penalty?

A.—Yes. Violations of the above rules will result in revocation of the license.
