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## HOW, WHAT AND WHY?

Controlling Moles  
Mrs. J. S. writes: "We have a four-acre plot and are troubled con- siderably with moles in lawn and garden. Will you advise how to de- stroy them?"

Dr. W. J. Hamilton, Jr., of the zoology department replies: "Moles are difficult to control, but if you are patient and persistent, you can usually destroy them.

"Trapping is generally the most satisfactory method, and special mole traps are needed. Place the traps in runways that are constant- ly used. To find these runways, punch a hole into the tunnel with a stick or stamp down the ridge with your foot. If the runway is repaired in a short time, it indi- cates a likely place to set a trap.

"The special traps take advantage of the fact that a mole will imme- diately push its way into a dirt blockade. The traps either straddle the runways, or encircle it, or are held suspended over the runway."

## Mildew on Books

C. C. asks: "How can I keep mil- dew from growing on my books? This summer the bindings on a number of my books in the book- case are badly stained with mil- dew."

The answer, from the United States Department of Agriculture: "If you keep your books in a closed bookcase, lime will help to save them from mildew. Place a can or two of plain unsalted lime behind the books, but only half-fill the cans with the lime. It expands as it absorbs moisture.

"Mildew, a fungus, thrives in a damp warm temperature. Whenever the relative humidity goes above 60 per cent, both cloth-bound and leather-bound books are likely to mildew. The lump lime absorbs moisture from the air, so the air in the bookcase will be kept fairly dry."
