Below are presented some questions and answers on the subject of the Vehicle and Traffic Law and rules of the road. Readers are invited to submit questions to Information Service, Bureau of Motor Vehicles, Albany, N. Y.

Question—Does New York State have compulsory automobile liability insurance?

Answer—No. New York State, however, does have a financial responsibility law.

Q.—What does the Financial Responsibility Law provide?

A.—Under its provisions, all licenses and registrations of persons convicted of certain offenses must be suspended until evidence of financial responsibility is shown to the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles.

Q.—What are the offenses which

place a person under the Financial Responsibility law?

A.—They are: Homicide or assault arising out of the operation of a motor vehicle or motor cycle, criminal negligence in the operation of a motor vehicle or a motor cycle resulting in death; speeding or reckless driving where injury or property damage results therefrom; leaving the scene of an accident; driving while intoxicated, or driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquors in another state.

Q.—Do the financial responsibility provisions apply to New York motorists convicted outside of the state?

A.—Yes. The same action is taken by the Bureau of Motor Vehicles.

Q.—How may proof of financial responsibility be given?

A.—By a bond of a surety company, or a bond with two individual sureties, each owning real estate within this state; or by liability insurance; or by the deposit of cash or securities.

Q.—Who may revoke or suspend a driver's license?

A.—Any magistrate or judge, in a city, or in a village of the first class, any supreme court justice, any county judge, any judge of a court

of general sessions, the superintendent of state police and the commissioner of motor vehicles or any person deputized by him, shall have power to revoke or suspend the license to drive a motor vehicle or motor cycle of any person, or in the case of an owner, the certificate of registration.

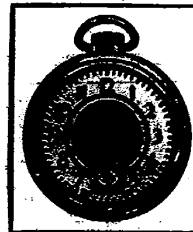
