Will Offer Lime in Payment to County Farmers

Belmont, Aug. 29.—The Allegany County Agricultural Conservation Committee has decided to offer lime in lieu of payment to Allegany county farmers this fall. The lime is to be applied before October 31st, 1939, and application must be filed before October 1.

Persons who are now in the Conservation program and who have not already used up their entire soil building allowance, and do not have an assignment or an A. C. P. loan, may use up their balance by obtaining lime. Persons not already in the program, but who have less than three acres of potatoes or eight acres of wheat may file a work sheet and co-operate if they desire. A farm which has more than three acres of potatoes or eight acres of wheat may also participate, providing there has been an allotment set for the farm previously.

The lime is to be applied according to specifications set forth under the 1939 Conservation program, at least one ton of pulverized lime to the acre on cropland or pastureland.

The farmer will need to pay only a small cost of 50c per ton to help pay local county costs, and this is payable at the time application for the lime is made. A top limit of 20 tons to a farm has been set. The lime will be furnished in lieu of payment for the remainder of the 1939 Agricultural Conservation program.

VILLAGE ORDINANCES

a penalty of Ten dollars (\$10.00) for each and every violation.

(b). No animal matter or vegetable matter such as culled potatoes, cabbage, etc., except such animal and vegetable matter as is contained in ordinary garbage shall be deposited in the dumping grounds leased or owned by the Village of Andover, but the same shall be disposed of either by burial, burning or otherwise if within the corporate limits of the Village in a manner approved by the Mayor or a majority of the Board of Trustees.

(c). The dumping grounds or premises leased or owned by the Village of Andover are for the exclusive use of residents of the Village and shall be used in accordance with the rules posted on said premises.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable to a penalty of Ten dollars (\$10.00) for each and every violation thereof.

SIDEWALKS

Sec. 1.—All sidewalks hereafter constructed adjoining a highway within the Village of Andover, N. Y., shall be of stone or concrete and shall be of a width of not less than four feet except that on Main Street between the north and south bridges of said Street they shall be at least five feet wide and shall be laid at the grade established for each street.

Sec. 2.—All stone and concrete sidewalks shall be laid upon a smooth tamped surface, with a sub-grade which shall consist of a six-inch fill of well tamped cinders or gravel. All concrete walk surface shall be constructed with concrete blocks having a thickness of four inches with one-eighth inch open expansion joint every four feet where four feet walks are required or as near that distance as may be practical to divide the distance into equal blocks; where five foot walks are required to be constructed the blocks shall be divided every five feet, by cross expansion joints, or as near as practical, and all material used in the construction of such sidewalk blocks, shall consist of one part Portland cement, two parts clean washed sand of a suitable fineness and composition, four parts clean washed gravel or crushed stone, and no other material shall be allowed in the construction of such concrete walks.

The specifications and requirements for all concrete driveway construction shall be the same as for sidewalks except that the concrete surface shall be six inches in thickness instead of four inches, as required for sidewalks.

Sec. 3.—Sidewalk Rebates. Any person owning or occupying lands adjoining a highway within the Village of Andover, N. Y., who shall construct a stone or concrete sidewalk, along the line of said highway, not less than five feet wide on Main Street or not less than four feet wide on other streets within said Village, shall be entitled to a rebate from the Village of one-half the actual reasonable cost of constructing said sidewalk provided such construction shall be approved by the Street Commissioner and shall be in accordance with the specifications set forth in Section 2 of this ordinance. No rebate shall in any event be in excess of one-half the actual cost of constructing a five-foot walk as herein specified. An itemized bill covering the actual cost of constructing said sidewalk shall be presented to the Clerk of the Village and payment of said rebate shall be made after approval by the Board of Trustees.

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time in any game on said Andover Athletic Park, neither shall it apply to any person using any portion of said streets, lanes or avenues as a passageway in the regular course of business while actively passing over the same without unnecessarily loitering thereon.

Sec. 3.—Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to the penalty of a fine of Five Dollars (\$5.00) for each and every violation.

MISCELLANEOUS

Sec. 1.—All penalties prescribed by these ordinances, or any section or article thereof may be sued for and recovered by the Board of Trustees in the name of the Village of Andover, and all penalties and forfeitures under these ordinances shall be for the benefit of said Village.

Sec. 2.—The violation of any of the provisions of the foregoing ordinances wherein a fine or a penalty is designated for such violation, shall constitute disorderly conduct and any person so violating any of said ordinances shall be deemed a disorderly person.

The foregoing ordinances shall take effect from and after the 15th day of September, 1939.

RESOLVED, that the Clerk shall cause these resolutions and the foregoing ordinances to be published in the Andover News, at Andover, New York, at least once, not less than ten days before the date of the taking effect thereof and shall post a copy of said resolution and these ordinances in at least three public places in the Village of Andover, New York, at least ten days before the date when the same shall take effect.
