Local Happenings

The first frost of the season was reported September 5 in this vicinity.

Thirty-six wells were reported as drilling in the Allegany field at the close of last week.

Leaving the scene of an accident in the town of Wellsville last week landed Raymond R. Goldsmith in Belmont jail for ten days.

Jackie, little son of Mr. and Mrs. John Huffman, fell from a swing Monday, causing a head injury which was dressed at Jones Memorial hospital, Wellsville.

Dr. Loren B. Bly of Bradford has located and will practice his profession in the town of Cuba. Dr. Bly was formerly staff physician in a Bradford hospital.

The Canadian wheat crop is said to be the biggest crop the Prairie Provinces have known since the all-time high of 1928.

The U. S. Crop Reporting Board reports conditions of commercial apple crop estimated at 64 per cent normal as compared with a 52 per cent normal crop last year.

Allegany County Health Camp Ends Successful Season

Care for 236 Children During Summer Camp Period. Management Highly Recommended.

With a record of 236 children cared for this year, 70 more than last year's record, the Allegany County Children's Health Camp closed its 1939 season Saturday. Three groups of children were received, the first two groups of 77 and 83 children, remained three weeks each, the last group of 76 for two weeks.

Splendid gains in weight and in general physical improvement of the children were reported. The children also enjoyed a summer of fun and frolic, with organized play, boat rides, swimming and bathing, picnics, hikes, crafts and training in health habits.

The camp was fortunate in having a capable and enthusiastic staff of counsellors, nurse and other attendants, the cook—a most popular member of the staff.

An unusual feature of this year's camp was that among the children were five sets of twins. Three sets were there in one group. Almost every town in the county had children at the camp. The staff members were from seven towns of the county.

The camp committee was particularly pleased by the report of the

State Department of Health after an inspection made by a representative of the Department. The camp management was highly recommended for its general program, and management and for the excellent house-keeping any sanitary conditions in this report. Miss Marie Dohm, field representative of the State Charities Aid Association, also visited the camp and spoke in high praise of the camp program and general set-up.
