### AROUND OUR HOUSE

#### MAKING SCHOOL CLOTHES

With the opening of school, the making of school clothes for the children becomes a concern to many mothers. Here are pointers, from the New York State College of Home Economics, to make the clothes serviceable.

For economy and long service, make the hems of little girls' dresses and small boys' blouses six or eight inches wide. When making the hem use the sewing machine to stitch the first fold one-tenth of an inch from the edge; then turn up the hem to the proper length and simply slip-stitch it into place. Later, the job of lengthening will be simplified.

A wide hem on a small boy's blouse allows for adjusting buttons. To keep these buttons from pulling out, use twilled tape as a reinforcement; use one-fourth-inch tape and stitch one edge of the tape to the hem edge, then turn up the hem so that the sturdy tape is right under the spot where the buttons that support the trousers will be sewed on. The supporting buttons will stay on longer if they are made firm by baby buttons fastened directly underneath on the inside of the garment.

Buttonholes also need attention. Plackets often gap because buttonholes slides or are placed incorrectly. To prevent this, place the top button at the upper end of the buttonhole and the second button at the lower end.

Pockets will be more serviceable if they are cut out large enough for the child's clenched fist to enter and withdraw easily. Place them low enough so that the hands cannot push down in them.

Double stitch any place where strains are likely to break the stitching, such as around the armholes, the underarm seams, neck edges and plackets.

### KNOW YOUR LAW

Below are presented some questions and answers on the subject of the Vehicle and Traffic Law and rules of the road. Readers are invited to submit questions to Information Service, Bureau of Motor Vehicles, Albany, N. Y.

**Question**—Is a person who moves into this state with non-resident license plates allowed any time in which to obtain New York plates?

**Answer**—Yes. The Vehicle and Traffic Law was amended this year to provide that when a non-resident becomes a resident of this state, he shall be entitled for 30 days to the same exemption from registering his vehicle in this state as he would have enjoyed had he remained a non-resident.

**Q**—Does that rule also apply to drivers' licenses?

**A**—Yes. Thirty days are also allowed during which the motorist may use his non-resident license.

**Q**—How is it possible to determine where a person's legal residence is if, for example, he has two residences—one in New York, the other outside this state?

**A**—Residence, under the Vehicle and Traffic Law, is a question of fact. A person who lives outside the state, but is gainfully employed here, and does not return to his home outside the state at least once a week, is considered a resident of New York State for purposes of registration and licensing.

**Q**—Who may restore a license?

**A**—A license or certificate of registration may be restored by direction of the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles but not otherwise. Reversal on appeal, of any conviction because of which any license or registration has been revoked or suspended, shall entitle the holder to restoration. The privileges of a non-resident may be restored by direction of the commissioner in his discretion but not otherwise.

**Q**—What happens if the holder of a junior operator's license becomes 18 years of age before his license expires?

**A**—He retains his junior operator's license until the proper renewal time. However, all restrictions attached to the license are automatically cancelled upon his 18th birthday.

**Q**—Is the driver of a vehicle coming into a street required to stop?

**A**—Yes. A vehicle emerging from an ally, driveway, garage or stable must be brought to a complete stop before entering the street and thereafter must enter the highway with care.

**Q**—Are there any special regulations for towing vehicles?

**A**—There are several. First, a towed vehicle requires no registration, but this does not allow a trailer to be hauled behind a motor vehicle unless it has been registered. Second, a motor vehicle may not be used to tow more than one vehicle, except in the case of a municipal garbage or ash collecting system. Further requirements are that the connection between the vehicles shall not be more than 16 feet and that where a rope or other nonrigid connection is used, the towed vehicle have an attendant.

**Q**—What regulations are there with reference to the operation of motor vehicles during a fire?

**A**—Upon the approach of fire vehicles as evidenced by warning either visible or audible, the driver of a vehicle is required to draw over as near as possible to the curb and parallel with it, remaining there until the apparatus has passed. It is unlawful to follow closer than 500 feet any fire engine or to drive into or stop within a block where the apparatus has stopped in answer to a fire. During a fire, or for that matter, at the time of an accident or special emergency, a peace officer is empowered to close any street or part thereof, if he deems it necessary.
