Dry Weather Lowers Production of New York Crops

Department of Agriculture and Markets Issues Report as of September 15th.

The dry weather which has prevailed over much of the State since early May has lowered the production of a great many of New York's crops, according to a Federal report released from the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets.

There will be less hay for use on the farm, grown this winter since the production of oats, barley, the grains usually grown, is less than a year ago, is, however, above the average since there were severe years in the ten-year average.

Hay is light in production, State as a whole, amounting only about 4,265,000 tons, only about 5,436,000 tons harvested and the ten-year average, 4,941,000 tons. This would be so bad if it were well over the State but some of the sections, especially in Sullivan, have had to feed so much of the poor pastures, many of them do not have hay to winter their livestock.

The drought this season has been confined to New York and neighboring states. West of the Mississippi River and east of the mountains, the drought is severe in portions of the States. These states have pasture conditions and in some cases are being hard on their livestock. The grain farmers were considerably difficult in their fields prepared for grain.

The dry weather has in fields of dry beans so that New York production promises to be less than last year, also above the year average. Through the bean growing states the have been very variable total production this season to be less than a year above the ten-year average.

The State potato crop, York promises to amount to 26,662,000 bushels compared with 26,840,000 bushels harvested and the ten-year average, 29,005,000 bushels. The crop has lowered the condition considerably and have been more injurious. Fair yields have been on Long Island and on lands upstate but many fields upstate need more and a few more weeks weather before frosts get to make proper size.

The pasture condition was reported at only 50 percent normal on September 15th. The pasture condition on record exceptions when a percent of normal was a great many pastures feed and in a large number.
