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#### A Grave Problem

T 1S becoming plain to our generation that the issues confronting us are vitally important to our ourselves -and our posterity. The question that now confronts us is: Will autocratic control, necessary to mee the problems of war, be also necessary to meet the problems of peace?

England and France say that peace talk on Hitler's terms cannot be accepted as yet. The United States, I Japan and Italy, three neutral nations, as neutral, have more influence on the war than they would have as belligerents. The importance of the United States just) now is as a supply base. The British apparently are waiting to see if Congress repeals the arms embargo. It has been pointed out that Japan's aims in the Farl East are basically in conflict with American interests there, but Japan has made every effort to placate American opinion. It has already sent out feelers for a new Japanese-American trade pact to replace the one recently denounced by Secretary of State Hull. United States is also a great factor in the Pacific and may determine whether or not Japan enters the war and on what side.

Italy is on the spot. Apparently it wishes to remain neutral and efforts are being made for peace. In case Italian military forces are drawn into the fighting to aid Germany, then French forces would be diverted complicating the Mediterranean problem. is of grave importance to find out what Italy will do.




