CCC Open for Enrollment

Between October 1-20 enrollment of 2,637 white juniors, 298 negro juniors, 200 white veterans and 100 negro veterans, will take place in New York State to fill the vacancies in the camps of the Schenectady District of the Civilian Conservation Corps.

Of the 2,637 white juniors, approximately 700 will have an opportunity to go West to the 9th Corps Area.

The requirements for enrollment in the junior camps are: A young man must be between the ages of 17-23 inclusive, unemployed and in need of employment and be able to pass a physical examination. It should be pointed out that a young man more than 23½ years of age is not eligible since he would reach the age of 24 before the expiration of his term of enrollment, which is for a period of six months, with the privilege of re-enrollment up to two years of service and to his 24th birthday.

Young men who are interested in becoming members of the Corps should apply to the local Department of Social Welfare. Veterans should apply to the nearest U. S. Army Recruiting Station.

Conservation Commission Release on Woodcock

In announcing the open season on woodcock which is October 16th in this county, the Conservation Commission calls attention to the following provision of the law relating to the hunting of woodcock:

The daily bag limit for each hunter is four woodcock and persons may not possess at any one time more than eight of these birds. They may be taken with a shotgun not larger than number 10 gauge fired from the shoulder or with bow and arrow. They may not be taken with or by means of any automatic loading or hand operated repeating shotgun capable of holding more than three shells, the magazine of which has not been cut off or plugged with a one-piece metal or wooden filler incapable of removal thru the loading end thereof, so as to reduce the capacity of said gun to not more than three shells at one time in the magazine and chamber combined.

Woodcock may be taken from the land or water with the aid of a dog, but not from or by means, aid or use of an automobile or aircraft of any kind.

Persons hunting woodcock are not required to have the Federal duck or hunting stamp, but, of course, must have their New York State hunting, fishing and trapping license.
