FRUIT, FLOWERS AND GARDEN

HOUSE PLANTS

Now that the beauties of the garden are on the wane, plant lovers are turning their attention indoors, to brighten dull winter days. Many house plants provide color and life house plant gardeners however, have a hard time because the dry atmosphere and high temperature of modern heated homes make indoor plant growing a difficult job.

Plant scientists have found that nearly all homes are kept at too high a temperature for plant growth. A temperature around 68 degrees should be warm enough and if the plants are kept in the coolest part of the room, they should stay healthy.

There is no danger of getting the atmosphere too moist in the ordinary home. Since the heating system tends to dry out the air, moisture may have to be supplied. Some persons put pans of water on the radiators or registers to supply moisture. In extremely dry atmosphere the plants may have to be grown in a shallow metal pan, filled with a wet layer of small pebbles, sand, and sphagnum moss, or peat moss. Keep this material wet.

Light, too, is essential, but the amount varies with the different

plants. Many ferns, for example, do not require the amount of sunlight that geraniums need.

Humidity, temperature, and light are three of the most common pitfalls of the house-plant gardener. Watch them, and most of the troubles with growing plants indoors will disappear.
