In the past all sorts of un-tested and unlabeled seed stocks have been trucked about promiscunave been trucked about promiscu-ously and poddled to unsuspecting farmers at so-called 'bargain' prices."

The interstate clause of the law will be administered in co operation with State officials and it is confidently believed that the quality of seed offered by certain sources will be vastly improved, and also, that unfair practices in the trade will be greatly minimized.
