Farmers Satisfied With Present Milk Marketing Prices

Hearings Held in Albany Last Week Show That Farmers Are Against Changing Orders.

Albany, Oct. 13.—After two days of public hearings upon proposed amendments to the New York federal-state milk marketing orders of dairy farmers' scores of dairy farmers' "leave well alone" attitude, and saying orders that are lifting prices returns to new high levels.

While the hearings, which held October 10 and 11, were proceedings lacking the usual charges and spirited dispute characterized many milk orders they were important in the effect upon the whole New York Milk Shed. Charles H. Baldwin, executive secretary of the Metropolitan Active Milk Producers' Bureau, which is composed of dairy farmers' co-operatives with members, said the proposals were roughly divided into three groups.

Some, he said, were sporadic genuine farmers' organizations of these is to assure stability, protection of shifting of milk supplies to the disadvantage of the milk and a tighter check on dealers to assure their paying according to the use to which milk is put.

In the second group, Mr. Baldwin assumed, were those inspired by dealers and if adopted would in another weaken the market, and eventually break down the program which during the months from October 1 to will add \$10,000,000 to milk checks.

Among the amendments proposed by the Producers' Agency was one described as the criticism of those unpriced milk. This would require dealers to pay prices for all milk from farms approved for New York City market regardless whether marketed in the city or some other market.

Another bargaining agency amendment would raise the 30 cent premium for dealers shipping milk from factoring plants during the December.

The Producers' Agency amendment that would move between plants, proposed an increase of milk used in low price conditions such as storage or other purposes.

Another producer favor would prevent dealers from paying for milk to points close to City. This is on the milk close to the market used for fluid purposes farthest away, movement to market entails high ton costs, should be used for factoring purposes.
